## **Listening for God's Call**

[Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the Temple,] "What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir;' but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

~ Matthew 21:28-32

## **O**ear family in Christ,

When you hear Jesus speak this parable against the chief priests and the elders of the Temple, what comes to your mind? How could Jesus say that tax collectors and prostitutes, likely the biggest examples of sinners in the vernacular of the day, are entering the Kingdom ahead of these well-learned and deeply committed practitioners in the faith?!? Surely, he is mistaken, for if the devout religious folk don't have a chance, how do the rest of us?

What's interesting about this parable is that Jesus speaks it after they question Jesus' authority (or source of power) to do these great works. We're talking deeds of power that haven't been witnessed since the last time such amazing things were recorded over 400 years prior! If Jesus has this kind of power AND is bashing the church leaders, he can't be a "good guy," right?

Why is the hero of our faith always going after those most connected to it? It's upsetting, isn't it? Well, most people tend to read themselves into the better parts of Jesus' stories. We're not like those dastardly chief priests, after all. But, perhaps we are? Perhaps we trend in that direction? But why is it so easy to fall into the trap of this same type of self-righteousness the faith leaders in Jesus' day exude?

The first child says they will not work, but then does it anyway. The second child says they will do it, but never does. It is easy to see that the one who does the will of the parent is the one who actually does something. The trap those of us in the established church fall into is that we start to convince ourselves that what we are doing in the Church is the will of the Father simply because we are doing it in the Church! It becomes a kind of autopilot where we say we are doing God's will, but we've actually stopped listening.

So, which child are you? Are you listening to God's call where the work is? Or are you answering without even hearing God in the first place? Are you appalled at the sinners who seek God's grace, or are you resentful of the religious folk who act as gateways for God's grace? Are you listening for God's will or are you declaring it on your own? Only you can answer these questions for yourself.

We are all sinners who depend on Jesus' righteousness and perfection. Thanks be to God that we are forgiven, loved, and accepted because of God's incarnate love in Jesus. May we trust in that forgiveness, listen for God's will, and do, gladly or reluctantly, for the glory of God.


# Reconciling in Christ Ministry Team Activities

this ministry team meets as needed. Over the year, we have considered issues relating to LGBTQ inclusion and anti-racism. A lengthy online meeting was held on April 11, 2022, centered on anti-transgender legislation and the larger national effort to undermine LGBTQ rights. The bottom line is that these are political and not scientific or medical movements and need to be understood and approached in that light.

We discussed the "Declaration of the ELCA to people of African Descent" in the Fall of 2021. We participated in the Ames NAACP Juneteenth celebration and offered a VOYAGERS Adult Forum in June 2022 using this same document. Upcoming will be a meeting to discuss "A Declaration of the ELCA to American Indian and Alaska Native People."

Finally, our ministry team helped to organize and host Dr. Stephanie Dykes, a transgender woman from Seattle. She gives a public concert "A Transgender Life: An Evening of Song and Story" on September 8, as well as participating in weekend worship and offering an adult forum on September 11.

# Activities of the Immigrant & Refugee Team

**B**ethesda has a long history of welcoming the stranger. We supported the Nguyen family from Vietnam in 1975. A Laotian refugee family was supported for 30 months beginning in 1986. We provided aid to a Ugandan refugee family in 1992. Bethesda began a new phase of welcoming with educational programs provided by the ELCA and LIRS (Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services).

In January 2022, this culminated in our congregation's an approval of a new welcoming statement based on the ELCA guideline from AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant

Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities).

We are members of two Ames organizations—Ames Sanctuary Interfaith Partnership (ASIP) and Ames Interfaith Refugee Alliance (AIRA). We are also recognized by ELCA and LIRS as involved in this mission of welcome. VOYAGERS Adult Forums have been held with information from both Ames organizations regarding sponsorship opportunities.



Most recently, the remodeled west duplex has been reserved for immigrants and refugees. A new Immigrant and Refugee Fund has been set up allowing donations

> to Bethesda for this work and a family will be coming from Ukraine through the North Americans for Ukraine organization.

Members of the Bethesda Immigrant and Refugee Ministry Team include Anne Almquist, Ann Hein, Russ Melby, Larry Otteman and Diane Pierce. More help is needed for this ministry—prayerfully consider joining.


**B** read for the World and the Story County Bread Team INVITE YOU TO ATTEND a 2023 Farm Bill listening session on **Monday, September 19**, from **6:30–8:30 pm** at the **Ames Public Library** in the Rotary Room.

Next year, Congress will consider the Farm Bill, a comprehensive piece of legislation renewed every five years that is an essential tool in fighting hunger. The Farm Bill not only sets most U.S. agriculture policies, but also authorizes both federal nutrition assistance programs, such as SNAP, and humanitarian relief for hunger emergencies overseas.

As you know, Bethesda as a congregation believes in the critical importance of feeding the hungry and has run its Food Pantry for many years as an essential part of its church mission work. The listening session is an opportunity for you to learn about the Farm Bill and why it currently matters so greatly to those in our communities and around the world who are facing food insecurity. We also want to hear from you. This is a tremendous opportunity for you to share your knowledge, experience, and judgment about what the Farm Bill should look like from the perspective of your organization, work, or lived experience.

We will gather for a large group presentation followed by small group discussions to listen and learn about your thoughts on this critical bill. Your opinions will help inform and advance Bread's 2023 Farm Bill platform.

Bread for the World is a collective Christian voice urging our nation's decision makers to end hunger at home and abroad. Bread organizes with member congregations and allies across the country who care about hunger and want to take action to make a difference. Bethesda is one of these congregations whose members help and provide opportunity at home and far beyond where they



live to change policies, programs, and conditions that allow hunger and poverty to persist. This is your chance to shape the legislation that can reduce and end hunger at home and abroad.




# Bethesda's **Call Committees** are **BUSY**

With the near simultaneous departure of Pastor Ryan and Mark Kretsinger-Harries, the Council and Congregation had the opportunity to reimagine pastoral leadership. At a special congregational meeting on May 22, 2022, two call committees were formed. One for an Associate Pastor of Youth and Family and one for an Associate Pastor of Worship Arts.

For all you who have served in that capacity, you know the work that goes into the call process. First a profile of Bethesda and Ames is constructed and that a detailed summary of expectations and commitments for the position. Each call committee accomplished this in record time with the Council approving both site profiles in early June. We have worked closely with the Synod liaison, Reverend Dan Kuckuck, who has provided valuable insight and advice. People may not realize the limited number of rostered clergy in the ELCA with a nationwide total of only 423 individuals available for call at this time.

Nonetheless, we have received inquiries about both positions and each call committees is in the midst of constructing a template of questions and arranging next steps. Of course, each call committee is constrained by a confidentiality agreement, so trust their judgment until we are ready to announce a candidate for the congregation's consideration. Please keep them in your prayers, though.
