# Relationships Build Faith ~ Pastor Bryan Simmons

"Anything that's human is mentionable, and anything that is mentionable can be more manageable. When we can talk about our feelings, they become less overwhelming, less upsetting, and less scary. The people we trust with that important talk can help us know that we are not alone."

Oear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There's a lot that's troubling our world lately. We're still in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our political divisiveness has become measurably greater. School shootings and gun violence are on the rise. The suicide rates in preadolescents and teens are significantly higher. Inflation is making it harder on our daily living. Russia is still assaulting Ukraine. Monkey pox? Heck, I'll throw that in there, too. It's a lot, and I think it's ok for us to acknowledge the overwhelming nature of it all.

In this world that's currently a bit much to navigate, I see an even bigger issue developing. Our society is getting increasingly individualistic, relying more on our devices than on each other for information, entertainment, and connection. It's made our relationships more disconnected, more information-based than emotional. I'm guessing many of us can name very few people we can truly open up to about our feelings. It's a sign that there are very few people we actually have a relationship close enough with to trust.

Yet it's in these very relationships of trust where we can open up emotionally and share very important things. It's in these relationships that make possible the sharing of the life-changing promise of love and forgiveness by our Creator and Redeemer with others. I thoroughly believe that in our overwhelming world, where trust is hard to come by, our mission as Gospel believers, as Christians, is to do exactly what Jesus said to do. Go out and make disciples of all nations. We do this as Jesus did, by seeking out others to form relationships of trust with, so that we may empower them to form relationships of trust with others, until all may know the saving grace of God. We cannot do this by simply hoping people come to us to hear the Good News.

It's not about knowledge, although diligent study of the faith is certainly encouraged just to satisfy our own hunger. But it truly is about relationship and trust; trust that you can share your story, trust that you can open up to others about what God means to you, trust that your misgivings about the Gospel story can be openly talked about and explored, and trust that the Holy Spirit is active in our conversations and working to build faith through our interactions with one another.

If it was all about knowledge, the Bible would've been sufficient for faith and Christian bookstores would be the central hub of congregations. But it was the eyewitnesses to the Resurrection who first told their family and friends and anyone willing to listen that is the foundation of our Church. We, in relationship to one another and to God, whose very being is relationship as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, share in this good news of love, life, and peace through Christ. May we be like Jesus, seek out new friends, so that God's life may flow through our relationships in this overwhelming world.

# Sometimes Less Can Be as Good as More

Prowing up a Lutheran, first Missouri Synod and later ELCA, I assumed that all faiths stated their beliefs or creed as part of the liturgy. Many American churches do not accept an historic creed as a summary of biblical truth. The Baptist Church is an example of a robust faith tradition that does just fine, thank you, without a creed.

You may know the names, and even the specific words of our common creeds: The Apostle's Creed, the Nicene Creed and the Athanasian Creed. Each is longer and more involved than the former. I would like to introduce you to a much briefer statement of faith.

It is most often referred to as the "Jesus Prayer" and is more widely practiced in the Eastern Orthodox Church. I find its simplicity very appealing.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

I encourage you to pray it three times as the repetition helps the words to sink in. Much is packed into these twelve words. It is worthwhile to ponder each word and its meaning to you. I hope you enjoy using this statement of faith as much as I do.


# Bethesda Elevator Grand Opening!

# Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Ministry Team Update

People are familiar with our revised welcoming statement and the emblem for Reconciling in Christ. Both appear in our e-newsletter and on our weekly bulletin. I would like to review other actions taken by the Congregation that also represent our commitments to RIC.

These changes in our bylaws are especially important as we call two Associate Pastors and hire new personnel. The first is a requirement to be included in all job descriptions, both called and hired. A commitment to actively promote an inclusive and welcoming community and to work for racial justice.

The second change is a promise from the Congregation to those we call as rostered leaders. Rostered staff (Pastor and Deacon) shall be responsible for those areas of mission and ministry assigned to them in their Letter of Call. In the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America, or ELCA, leadership is open to all people. Bethesda Lutheran is committed to being inclusive and to racial equity and anti-racism. All positions of rostered leadership are open to both LGBTQIA+ individuals as well as Black, Brown, and Indigenous Persons of Color (BIPOC).

#### **Restoring Hope**

Over the last year, LSI and its many community partners across lowa have come together in a time of need. When hundreds of Afghan evacuees needed a place to call home in lowa, LSI rose to the challenge to provide crucial resettlement services.

Supporters from across the state rallied together to provide financial support; they put together almost 600 welcome boxes so every individual had what they needed when they arrived; and they volunteered their time to provide assistance with transportation and housing during a distressing time.

In our offices in Des Moines and Sioux City, LSI was able to hire additional staff who speak 14 different languages. In December 2021, for the first time in 10 years, LSI began welcoming new arrivals to Iowa, and we have since welcomed more than 165 individuals – including many families – to their new home in Iowa. Thanks to the support of our partners, Iowa continues to be a space of welcome, a place where individuals can find safety, security, and a community where they can rebuild their lives.
