
There was darkness. That much was clear. The winter solstice, in so many ways, was weeks away still.

 \mathcal{Y} ay! No more negative political ads (for awhile)! I pray now that everyone can listen to each other and work together for the common good.



I hope you have had the opportunity to spend some time in fellowship with your church brothers and sisters. If you know someone who is alone, please reach out to them. Reconciling in Christ Task Force Update

WHAT The phrase "Reconciling in Christ" is an established term for ELCA communities to use to announce that they publicly and explicitly welcome and affirm individuals who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, asexual and/or more (LGBTQIA+). For nearly a year, members of Bethesda Lutheran Church have met to discern if now is the time to take this public step. This is an update of our progress toward that goal.

WHY TAKE THIS STEP? We wish to communicate that we as a people of faith have dedicated time, prayers and effort to educate ourselves and to stand against the discrimination that individuals face in regard to gender expression, gender identity and sexual orientation. We are committed to provide a safe space for LGBTQIA+ individuals who have experienced exclusion and harm from people who acted in the name of Christianity. We proclaim our stance publicly to help others be courageous in broadening their own sense of what it means to welcome others in.

PROCESS We have followed the multiple-step process found in "Building an Inclusive Church." This includes sharing what calls us to this project, studying whether now is the right time to proceed, and reaching out to lay leaders for their input. At each step, we felt strongly that we should continue. Then physical isolation became the overriding safety mandate and we had to adapt. Zoom discussion groups open to all focused on appropriate terminology and effective allyship and a prayerful and thoughtful response to specific "clobber" biblical passages was led by both pastors. Miriam Chadima led an in-depth study of the same issues in a six-week book study of *UnClobber: Rethinking our Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality* by Colby Martin.

NEXT STEPS Throughout November, members of the task force will explain why they support Bethesda Lutheran becoming a Reconciling in Christ ELCA congregation. A congregation-wide survey will take place to be sure we have understood correctly that now is the right time to take this step and what more should we do to help you understand the issues. Then, a formal vote will take place during our annual meeting in January 2021. Scan the QR code at right with your smart device to go straight to the survey.



How DO WE CONFIRM OUR COMMITMENT TO LGBTQIA+ COMMUNITIES? We have learned that we must do more than say "all are welcome" even as we hold this out to be true. We must be explicit and detailed. To

become a congregation recognized as Reconciling in Christ, we must affirm our support of all people regardless of gender expression, gender identity and sexual orientation.

WHAT DO WE GAIN BY TAKING THIS STEP? We witness that we are blessed to be a blessing to others. We will join the roster of ELCA Reconciling in Christ congregations that is information available for everyone seeking this type of church home. Go to <u>www.reconcilingworks.org</u> to learn more about this roster. We know that over 70% of people born after 1980 support same sex marriages and want their children to grow up in a church in which they know that their children will be welcomed and loved no matter how they identify themselves.

WHAT IS THE STATEMENT OF WELCOME WE WILL BE VOTING ON? As the task force members continued to meet and learn, we reviewed the welcoming statements of other congregations regarding the inclusion of LGBTQIA+ individuals. We discovered that the same spirit of inclusion prompted churches and communities of faith to recognize their unintentional exclusion of many other groups. Those congregations expanded their welcomes to explicitly embrace many individuals their church or The Church has left behind. The task force recommended to the Church Council that we adopt the same expanded welcoming statement.

Food Pantry Hasn't Missed a Scheduled Day

 \mathbf{C} wo recent changes at the Food Pantry have gone smoothly during these pandemic times. In September the pantry moved to a 3-day a week schedule, eliminating Monday morning. Curbside service which began when the pandemic hit in March will continue as the weather begins to change. Pantry volunteers will hand out a clipboard with a sheet of paper indicating food items currently available. The guest will make their choices and a volunteer will pick up the sheet and return it to the pantry for the order to be filled. Once the order is filled a volunteer delivers the food to the guest's vehicle.

Since the reduction in the number of days the pantry has been open we have seen an increase in our numbers. We are serving about 215 families per month. This compares to about 180 from the beginning of Covid-19 in March through the end of summer. However, prior to the pandemic we were serving about 250 families per month. So, numbers are up but not to pre-Covid-19 levels. Eliminating Mondays really had no impact on the numbers of visitors. The majority of people visit the pantry on Tuesdays and Thursdays. This holiday season we're handing out \$50 Fareway gift cards and have purchased 300 to date. We have a diverse clientele and we want them to be able to purchase the food they want for holiday celebrations as opposed to us assuming what they would like. The gift cards cannot be used to purchase alcohol, tobacco or lottery tickets. An Extension calendar will be distributed to each guest and the Day for Girls Ministry Team will create holiday stockings for distribution to our guests.



Provided through LSI's Services for People with Disabilities, Host Homes provides personalized care for lowans with disabilities who find greater success living in a private family home instead of a busier community living environment with roommates. Individuals are carefully matched with a Host Homes mentor and live with them in their home, where they can build strong relationships and become better engaged with their communities.

Marty became a Host Homes mentor so Sam could continue living in her home and receive the same care and support she was used to. Sam is thriving and Marty gets to continue walking alongside her as she builds a bright future full of independence. They work on Sam's goals every day, including cooking and planning meals. Marty especially loves fishing and going on picnics with Sam and as a Host Homes mentor, she can continue serving as a foster parent to other lowa teens.
